AN EXPLANATION FOR THE SHOES

White was the colour of mourning in the early Church. These shoes represent those who have died in 2022 and 2023 from domestic, family and intimate partner violence. The coloured shoes are a sign of hope as we celebrate and honour those who have survived to live beyond the violence and create new lives. Let us give thanks for those who are alive and mourn the lives of those who have been murdered.

The Ven. Dr. Lucy Morris:

Welcome to all MU members, friends and visitors who have come to St Mark's Anglican Church, Buderim for this service. It is held as part of the 16 Days of Global Activism with the world-wide Mothers Union seeking justice for the 1 in 3 women suffering from gender-based violence and abuse.

We gather today to raise our voices to our Creator and Mothering God, who knew us before we were knit in our mother's womb, who hears our cries, shares our tears, witnesses our anger, and who is steadfast in love for us all, now and forever. We come together to remember, name, and respond to the violence in all our lives, in families, churches, communities and governments.

All: Let us walk this way together.

Let us move into the church following the shoes, and find our seats; please remain standing as we sing the first hymn.

Let us sing:

Jesus Christ is waiting, waiting in the streets; no-one is his neighbour, all alone he eats. Listen, Lord Jesus, I am lonely too. Make me, friend or strange, fit to wait on you.

Jesus Christ is raging, raging in the streets, where injustice spirals and real hope retreats. Listen, Lord Jesus, I am angry too. In the Kingdom's causes let me rage with you.

Jesus Christ is healing, healing in the streets; curing those who suffer, touching those he greets. Listen, Lord Jesus, I have pity too. Let my care be active, healing just like you.

Jesus Christ is dancing, dancing in the streets, where each sign of hatred he, with love, defeats. Listen, Lord Jesus, I should triumph too, where God conquers evil let me dance with you. *Please be seated.*

Rev'd Deb Bird:

We have come in solidarity to mourn, to express our anger and outrage as we remember the women and children who have died: to offer witness to their suffering and death, and to share our lamentation. We stand at the foot of the cross with them crucified, and together, look beyond, with hope in God our Creator.

We bring before you Lord, the lives of all those who have suffered violence in intimate relationships.

We remember those precious individuals killed during 2021 and 2022 in Australia because of gender-based family, domestic and intimate partner violence. We give thanks to those who are alive and have survived. We give thanks for their courage and resilience. We thank those helpers and encouragers who helped them to survive.

We pray for healing and hope for us all.

In our sorrow and anger, with our prayers and tears we gather. We know God suffers with each woman, each child and all humanity. We know God suffered as Jesus in his undeserved persecution, oppression, control, constant abuse, betrayals and innocent death, through state sanctioned murder.

Today we break our silence once again, with the chorus of all who have gone before us, to give voice to the powerless who have been abused by those with power; and to remember the empty cross of Jesus, as the sign of hope for all who are still struggling with violence in their lives and homes.

We stand together with one another and with Jesus as we remember everyone who has been killed and murdered during the last year.

A candle is lit by Jenny Duckworth, Chairperson MU Buderim:

O God, come to our assistance: O lord, hasten to help us.

The Lord our God gives us salvation and victory: the Lord our God brings us light and life God's right hand has done wonders: so let us proclaim the works of our God.

Give ear to our words, O God; give heed to our groaning.

Listen to the sounds of our cries, O God: we're calling out to you.

O God, you hear our voices: we plead our case to you as we watch and wait.

Litany of Acknowledgement: Sue Milwright, MU Buderim

God in whose image we are made, women and girls are undervalued across the world. Help us to affirm their gifts and their personhood, as they are beautifully and wonderfully created. Spare them from sexual harassment, molestation, and ritual abuse. Defend them from violent crimes, being kept in captivity, and atrocities of war, with rape as a weapon used by soldiers, and help us to love and respect them as part of your good creation. We all live and work with women and children. We live together in a society where violence is real. **We say clearly, this must not be.**

We pause today to recognise there are many among us who have been wounded, broken, hurt and suffering through violence, exploitation, coercion, and manipulation.

There are many among us who are suffering and grieving.

There are many who need support and healing, who need their voices heard, their stories acknowledged, and their experience validated. The weight of oppression is heavy. The effects of trauma are real and long-lasting.

We recognise all of us are impacted by the culture of violence, intolerance, and entitlement in which we live. May we listen to one another and to God; may we become instruments of God's peace.

Reading by Glenda Bryant, Pastoral Care Co-ordinator Isaiah 65:17-25

For I am about to create new heavens and a new earth; the former things shall not be remembered or come to mind. But be glad and rejoice forever in what I am creating; for I am about to create Jerusalem as a joy, and its people as a delight. I will rejoice in Jerusalem, and delight in my people; no more shall the sound of weeping be heard in it, or the cry of distress. No more shall there be in it an infant that lives but a few days, or an old person who does not live out a lifetime; for one who dies at a hundred years will be considered a youth and one who falls short of a hundred will be considered accursed. They shall build houses and inhabit them; they shall plant vineyards and eat their fruit.

1	Our Church acknowledges and laments the violence which has been suffered by some of our members and repents of the part we have played in allowing an environment where violence went unaddressed.
2	Our Church leaders commit to ensure conditions that support the prevention of violence, a church culture that promotes equality, and support for those who experience violence.
3	Our Church consistently teaches about equality, freedom

- from violence, respectful relationships and the honour/value of every person.
- 4 Our Church affirms that human relationships are to be based on respect and mutuality.
- 5 Our Church acknowledges the different experiences of all people and that these have played a part in whether they have been treated with respect and equality

6	Our Church actions are directed by the gospel of love, peace and justice, and are informed and engaged with local, state and national government initiatives as appropriate.
7	Our Church supports cultural change in our communities by communicating effectively to our members.
8	Our Church trains our leaders, pastoral staff and parish councils to understand and be equipped to respond in ways that prevent and address domestic and family violence.
9	Our leaders and pastoral staff hold themselves to account and are guided by the Anglican Church's Code of Conduct: <i>Faithfulness in Service.</i>
10	These commitments are regularly reviewed and improved.
